Interview with Wallace R. Wirths

On September 6, the Wirths Campus of Upsala College began its first classes, thanks to Upsala's largest donor, Mr. Wallace R. Wirths.

Mr. Wirths has lived in north Jersey all of his life, being born in Englewood. A former Westinghouse executive, Mr. Wirths has a degree from Lehigh University in business administration. After spending 25 years at Westinghouse, last November Mr. Wirths left on sick leave and remains undecided whether he will return.

For the past 25 years Mr. Wirths has lived on his farm, which started with 70 acres and eventually grew to 300 acres, 270 of which he has donated to Upsala.

Mr. Wirths chose to donate the land to Upsala because of the tremendous impression Dr. Rodney Felder, Upsala's President, made upon him. Mr. Wirths feels they closely share beliefs, ideas and philosophies on what a school should and shouldn't be.

Mr. Wirths is pleased and takes great satisfaction in watching the school develop and he predicts that next fall there will be about 500 students enrolled. Mr. Wirths also feels that the school will become a cultural center for the entire county.

When asked about his impressions of the professors he has met, Mr. Wirths feels that they have fantastic backgrounds and he was very impressed with all of them. As a student himself, Mr. Wirths enjoys tremendously his Greek Philosophy class.

This has been a year of ups and downs for Mr. Wirths. His father passed away this year at the age of 93. On the brighter side, he is very happy now that he has officially become a father. His adoption of Harold was approved a short time ago. Harold is 14 and is attending Franklin High School. Mr. Wirths was his "Big Brother" since Harold was 8 years old.

After donating such a large asset, Mr. Wirths is taking great satisfaction in seeing the property being put to such good use. He is certain that the community will appreciate the educational growth that Upsala will bring to our county.
