# To Parents.

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In all cases when the pupil is absent with your consent please give a written excuse.

The Board of Education requests that all Parents and Guardians assist in the enforcement of the following Compulsory School Law as your co-operation is absolutely necessary to realize the best results in the education of your child.

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## NEW JERSEY

SECTION 153. Every parent, guardian or other person having control of a child between the ages of seven and seventeen years inclusive, shall cause such child to regularly attend a day school in which, at least, the common school branches of reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, English grammar, and geography are taught by a competent teacher, or receive equivalent instruction elsewhere than at school, unless such child is above the age of fifteen years and has completed the grammar school course prescribed by the State Board of Education, and in addition thereto is regularly and lawfully employed in any useful occupation or service. Such regular attendance shall be during all the days and hours that the public schools are in session in the city, town or district in which the child resides, unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Board of Education of the school district in which such parent, guardian or other person resides, that the bodily or mental condition of such child is such to prevent his or her attendance at school. If such child be within the age of seventeen years and has completed the grammar school course and is not regularly and lawfully employed in any useful occupation or service, such child shall attend the high school or manual training school in said city, town or district in which such child resides, if there is a high school or manual training school in said city, town or district; if there is no high school or manual training school in said city, town or district, said child shall be transported to a high school or manual training school as provided in section one hundred and nineteen of this act.

2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Approved April 13, 1908.

SECTION 154. Any parent, guardian or other person having the legal control of any child who shall fail to comply with the provisions of section one hundred and fifty-three of this act shall be deemed to be a disorderly person and upon sworn complaint made by the truant officer or other person designated, to any justice of the peace, police justice or city or town recorder acting as such within the municipality wherein such school district shall be situate, shall be apprehended upon warrant issued to any constable of the county, and upon conviction shall be punishable as a disorderly person.
